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Last month, Alberta's recent Premier Jason Kenny and several Cabinet Ministers were in Fort McKay to join Chief Mel Grandjamb and various community members and participate in a celebration of the Moose Lake 10-Kilometre Access Management Plan. The event was held at the Band Hall and included a lunch, presentations, and a special performance from the Fort McKay NorthWind Dancers and Drummers.

During the ceremony, Chief Mel Grandjamb gave Alberta

Premier Jason Kenny a gift in recognition of his work in support of the Moose Lake 10-Kilometre Access Management Plan and shared that "If it wasn't for Premier Kenney and Mr. Nexon, we would not have the Moose Lake protection zone."

In 2020, FMFN and the Alberta Government developed a plan in collaboration that helps protect our Treaty Rights, including traditional land uses and cultural practices.

During their visit, they were given a tour of the community, including the new Elsie Fabian school, and helped plant some trees at the school.

The Land Code and Individual Agreement shall be approved if a minimum of 25% of Eligible Voters cast a ballot in the Ratification Vote and a majority of the participating Eligible Voters vote to approve them.

FORT MCKAY FIRST NATION JOINS MAJOR PIPELINE PARTNERSHIP



Fort McKay First Nation recently entered into another exciting business venture and joined 22 other First Nation and Métis communities in developing an equity stake in seven Northern Alberta pipelines. The new business entity is known as Athabasca Indigenous Investments (AII), and of the 23 partnerships that have been created, our community holds a five percent investment in the company.

“This investment is the largest Indigenous energy focused investment in Canadian history,” said Chief Mel Grandjamb. “We are proud that FMFN played a key role in the negotiating and structuring this deal over the last several months.”

Other communities involved in the partnership include Athabasca Chipewyan First Nation, Chipewyan Prairie First Nation, Fort McMurray First Nation, Mikisew Cree First Nation, Beaver Lake Cree Nation, Cold Lake First Nations, Frog Lake First Nations, Heart Lake First Nations, Kehewin Cree Nation, Onion Lake Cree Nation, Saddle Lake Cree Nation, Whitefish (Goodfish) Lake First Nation, Buffalo Lake Métis Settlement, Elizabeth Métis Settlement, Fishing Lake Métis Settlement, Kikino Métis Settlement, Fort McKay Métis Nation, Chard Métis Nation, Conklin Resource Development Advisory Committee Local #193, Fort Chipewyan Métis Local #125, Fort McMurray Métis Local #1935, and Willow Lake Métis Nation.

Pipelines that are involved in the transaction include the Athabasca, Wood Buffalo/Athabasca Twin and associated tanks; Norlite Diluent; Waupisoo; Wood Buffalo; Woodland; and the Woodland extension. The Athabasca Indigenous Investments is expected to offer high and consistent income through long-life resources and long-term contracts.

Enbridge, which is currently the largest pipeline company in Canada, continues to be the operator and majority owner. “FMFN appreciates Enbridge’s efforts in providing this investment opportunity and in working closely with all 23 Indigenous communities. We look forward to being co-owners with them for decades to come,” shared Chief Grandjamb. “This investment gives FMFN the opportunity to participate in the financial benefits of the oil which is extracted from its traditional territory.”

Athabasca Indigenous Investments comprises a combined 1.12-billion-dollar investment and will offer an 11.6 percent non-operating interest from the seven pipelines operated by Enbridge in the Athabasca region of northern Alberta. Over time, the investment will be producing annual distributions to all of the 23 investors, and once the debt is repaid the returns will substantially increase. The life expectancy of this business venture is anticipated to correspond with the 50-70 year lifetime of the oilsands and will continue to generate significant income for the 23 investors for many generations to come.

"During my time as a Family Court Counsellor, I worked with many families in Fort McKay and helped them not only with family court matters but also worked with them to preserve their family units and keep children in the community with family while assisting parents with addictions and mental health," she shared. In addition to her professional ties, Liz has volunteered for Treaty Days and attended many cultural events in our community on many occasions.

Liz has always had a passion for Indigenous culture, thanks to her adoptive father and sister who are both Indigenous, and brought her up learning about their culture. "This is what inspired me to take my degree with a focus on rural, remote, and Aboriginal communities. Ever since I was a little girl, I have had a love for the culture and the beauty that it brings with it, the Elders' stories, the drumming, dancing, trapping, hunting, and the sense of community! I take great pride in teaching the history and culture to my two children."

What she loves most about Fort McKay is that it reminds her of her hometown. "From the way the community is laid out and its size and the fact that it has a river that runs through it as my home community gives me a sense of peace when I am here. I also love how hard Fort McKay is working to preserve its culture for their children." She is very enthusiastic about her new position, as addiction and mental health work are what Liz is most passionate about professionally. "When given the opportunity to take this role I was honored, to be part of such an amazing community that is doing so much for its residents. If I could be even a small part of that, I would consider the work I was doing worthwhile. I am excited to be part of my client's journey to recovery and mental wellness which will hopefully contribute to the overall betterment of the community as a whole".

Liz is a proud mother of two children, and during her spare time, she enjoys baking and trying new recipes with her kids and tries to travel with her family as much as she can.

PROTECT YOURSELF AND YOUR COMMUNITY AGAINST INFLUENZA THIS SEASON

Getting immunized against influenza and COVID-19 is the best way to protect yourself and your community. Vaccines help make your immune system stronger and help build antibodies.

Keeping the number of influenza cases and outbreaks low can help protect ourselves as well as at-risk Albertans and reduce the pressure on our healthcare system. Influenza is an infection of the nose, throat, and lungs that is caused by a virus.

SYMPTOMS START SUDDENLY AND MAY INCLUDE:

- a fever and chills
- a sore throat or cough
- a headache
- muscle aches
- poor appetite
- feeling tired



Other symptoms may include feeling sick to your stomach (nausea), vomiting (throwing up), or having loose stool (diarrhea). These symptoms are more common in young children. In some cases, influenza can lead to a lung infection (pneumonia) or make other health problems worse. Even healthy, young people can get very sick or die from influenza.

It is important to get the influenza vaccine each year if you:

- have a high risk for influenza
- have close contact with someone who has a high risk, such as family members and caregivers
- are a healthcare provider (it helps protect you and the people you care for)

Immunization, combined with good hygiene, physical distancing, masking and staying home when sick, help prevent the spread of influenza and other respiratory illnesses. Alberta saw 2,906 cases of ultraseasonal influenza, last year, with more than 1.2 million doses of influenza vaccine administered.

Influenza vaccines are available to Albertans six months of age and older, free of charge. AHS encourages all Albertans over the age of five to also get their COVID-19 immunization primary series or booster shot when booking their influenza immunization appointment.

FORT MCKAY FIRST NATION



The Fort McKay First Nation Land Code will replace 44 sections of the Indian Act with Fort McKay's own land and resource management laws and rules. All Fort McKay Members (18+) will be asked to approve the Land Code & Individual Agreement with Canada by a referendum vote on December 13, 2022.

If the vote passes, Chief and Council and the Minister of Indigenous Services Canada will sign the Individual Agreement and the Land Code will come into effect.

Voter information packages were provided to all Eligible voters the week of October 24th. Members living off-reserve will receive their packages in the mail. The packages included:

- A copy of the Land Code and Individual Agreement
- Summaries of the Land Code and Individual Agreement
- Notice of vote and instructions on how to vote
- Maps of Fort McKay First Nation land

Membership approval of the Land Code

There will be in person polls and an electronic voting option available through OneFeather electronic voting system. E-voting opened on October 28th and will remain open until December 13th at 8:00PM.

ON LAND CODE INITIATIVE

LAND CODE FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q: Does enacting a Land Code “overwrite” First Nation Treaty history or obligations?

A: No. Treaty and Indigenous rights are not impacted by the Land Code. Canada is not off the hook for any past or ongoing obligations relating to Treaty if a Land Code is enacted.

Q: Will the land code apply to all Fort McKay reserve land and territory?”

A: The Land Code will apply to Fort McKay First Nation’s 5 reserves and may also apply to any land that Fort McKay adds to reserve in the future. The Land Code will not apply to Fort McKay’s traditional territory.

Q: Do First Nations become “Municipalities” once they enact a Land Code?

A: No. Land Code does not change Fort McKay First Nation’s status as a First Nation or Band as defined by the Indian Act.

Q: Does Land Code impact taxation on reserve?

A: No. The parts of the Indian Act that apply to taxation will still be in place, including tax exemptions on property and income for Fort McKay members living and working on reserve.

Q: Will the Land Code impact how housing is allocated and managed by Fort McKay First Nation?

A: No. The policies and bylaws that are currently used to allocate and manage housing in Fort McKay will still apply. The Land Code does not replace those.

Q: Are there other First Nations that have Land Codes?

A: Yes! There are over 100 First Nations that have enacted their own land codes, and about 60 more that are actively in the process of developing a land code for their community. That is almost two-thirds of all First Nations in Canada that are opting out of the Indian Act by putting a land code in place. Woodland Cree Nation (Treaty 8) recently voted to become the first Land Code First Nation in Alberta!

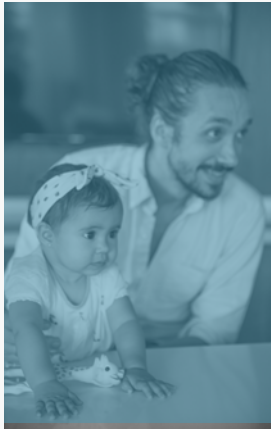

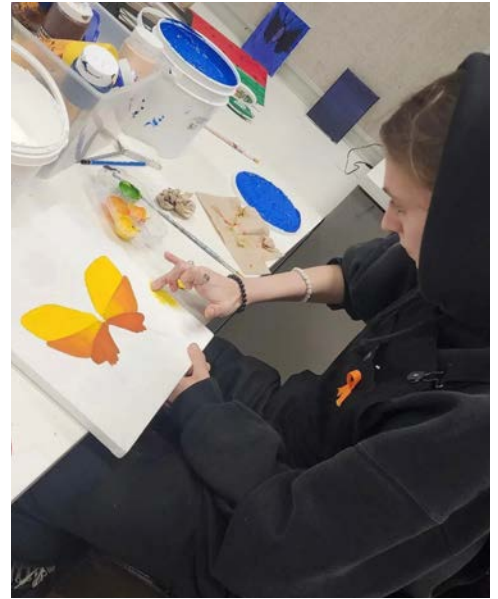
THE YOUTH CENTRE

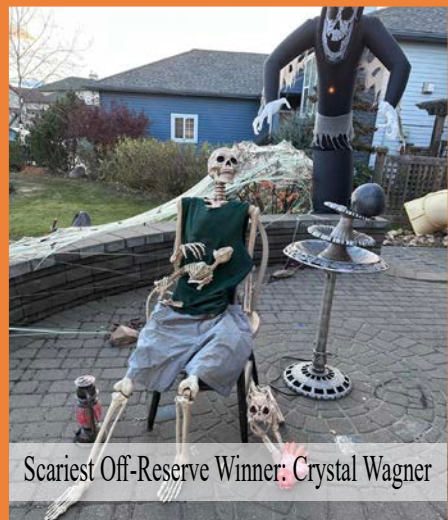
